What would you let your children tattoo on their forehead? Digital permanence is an issue facing the generation of "native" speakers of technology. Everything that an individual writes on the Internet, texts, or emails is potentially retrievable in the future. It is always present on the web and, just like a tattoo, it never goes away. Talk with your children about what they put out into the digital world. Students have lost jobs and university scholarships from posting comments about a teacher or peer. If you are purchasing a phone for your child, take time to reveal the responsibilities of this awesome tool. They are responsible for what they text to other people. They need to realize that this text can be forwarded to any number of people once it is sent. It is out of their control. If a child needs to express their dislike of an individual, teach them to talk with you at home about their displeasure.

Never post personal comments on a digital source. Only say online what you would say to someone's face directly. Tone and emotion are not transmitted through digital media and can be construed by the receiver of the message. Tattoos can be removed with procedures, but digital words are permanent.

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Health Services

End-of-the-Year Information

Our health offices are busy getting all the end-of-the-year reports completed and are already preparing for next year. A few tidbits of information to remember:

- Any medications that you have at school for your child will need to be picked up at the health office, or call to have arrangements made with
 the nurse in your child's building before the last day of school or they will be safely discarded.
- Remember if there are any changes in your child's health status during the summer, or you have concerns about your child entering school in the fall due to a health condition, please notify health services. If specific accommodations will be needed, please contact Cheryl Malecha Kollasch over the summer. She can work with you to develop an individualized health plan or emergency care plan for your child. If there is already a plan in place for your child, please expect a plan to be mailed to you during the summer for you to make updates and return. This will help ease the transition into school for next fall.
- If your child will require medication to be given during the 2014-15 school year, make sure to get a signed physician's order along with the medication. We will not be able to give out medication without this order and that includes any over-the-counter medications as well.

Spring Safety Tips

- Make outdoor time a safe time wear a helmet when riding bikes, skateboards, and scooters. Knee pads and elbow pads are easy to wear and add more protection.
- Limit outdoor exposure when the pollen or mold counts are high if you have sensitivities. You can check daily particulate counts on the weather channel.
- Poison Ivy, Oak, and Sumac contain oil causing an allergic skin reaction that looks like swollen itchy red bumps and blisters appearing wherever the oil has touched the skin. Check the areas around your home and teach your kids to recognize and avoid it.
- Stinging insects are back If you are stung, remove the stinger as soon as possible with a scraping motion. Wash with soap and water and apply a cold compress. If trouble breathing, severe swelling or fainting occurs, call 911 or an emergency number right away.
- Animal bites don't disturb a sleeping dog or a dog that's eating! Wash wounds well with soap and water and call the pediatrician.
 A tetanus or rabies shot may be needed.
- Ticks are already a problem in our area use tweezers or fingers to grasp as close to the head as possible and pull the tick away from where it is attached. Call the pediatrician for symptoms of a rash or fever.
- Swimming pools will be opening this month a great way to have some fun in the sun and spend time with family and friends. Review water and sun safety rules every day, and don't forget to use sunscreen.
